DAFNE (Dose Adjustment For Normal Eating) is a structured education programme for people with type 1 diabetes.

The UHL team have been running DAFNE courses since 2002 with 14-16 courses planned for 2014. Each DAFNE course includes a 30 minute pre-course appointment, a five day DAFNE course and a half day follow up appointment six weeks after the DAFNE course.

Anyone can attend a DAFNE course if they have type 1 diabetes (for more than 6-12 months), can speak and understand English and are willing to have multiple daily injections.

For those with new onset type 1 diabetes we offer a shorter structured education foundation programme. This aims to provide attendees with an opportunity to meet others with newly diagnosed type 1 diabetes and to learn some basic skills and knowledge as a first step to self management. Anyone with new onset type 1 diabetes who can speak and understand English is encouraged to attend, regardless of their insulin regimen.

We now have over 1000 DAFNE graduates in Leicester! In addition to the course, we frequently run skills refresher sessions for DAFNE graduates to brush up on key areas such as insulin dose adjustment and carbohydrate counting.

Our local DAFNE 'graduates' have set up their own User Support and Social Group. They meet on a regular basis for recreational activities such as pub quizzes, walks or bowling and have a list of fixtures planned for the year. They also welcome friends and family.



New Paediatric and Adolescent Sport and Exercise Medicine Clinic

We are pleased to announce our popular Sport and Exercise Medicine (SEM) service now includes a weekly Paediatric and Adolescent SEM clinic based in the Children's Hospital at Leicester Royal Infirmary.



The clinic has close links with Paediatric Orthopaedics and Physiotherapy and recognises the need

for a SEM service aimed towards the needs of the active adolescent. The majority of musculoskeletal problems in this age group (10-16 years) can be managed non-operatively and a key aim is to maintain and promote engagement with physical activity within this population, ensuring a speedy recovery from a wide range of musculoskeletal problems. In addition the SEM Clinic is set up to review



adolescents with other concerns regarding participation in exercise.

The adolescent SEM clinic is led by Dr Kim Gregory, Consultant in Sport and Exercise Medicine, who joined the SEM department in February 2014. Outside of her work at UHL she continues to work as a Sports Physician for the Talented Athlete Scholarship Scheme (TASS) and also works with elite football and ice hockey teams.

Referrals to the adolescent SEM Clinic can be made via Choose and Book, or by letter to



the Paediatric/Adolescent SEM Clinic based at the Paediatric Orthopaedic Outpatient Department at the Children's Hospital, Leicester Royal Infirmary. Alternatively, the main SEM department based at Leicester General Hospital will be happy to help and advise on 0116 258 4365. The aim is to see referrals within a few weeks.

- Ankle/foot pain following injury including Severs disease
- Lower limb exertional pain
- Acute sports injuries

Digitising Patient Notes in Clinical Genetics

In partnership with IBM, the Clinical Genetics department at UHL is transforming the way it works by digitising all paperbased family records.

The Clinical Genetics department in Leicester currently has around 20,000 sets of family notes dating back to the 1980's which are stored onsite in the department. As part of a Managed Business Partner agreement between UHL and IBM, we have started a project to digitise the paper based records stored in Clinical Genetics. As part of the project, over an eight week period, IBM worked with us to determine our requirements, implement the solution, train the team and actively use it within the department.

Once the system was live, almost all our Clinical Genetics case notes were scanned in a one off scanning exercise and loaded into the Electronic Document Record Management (EDRM). They are indexed according to the family (pedigree) number and surname. The paper notes are stored off-site with the scanning provider. Optical Character Recognition (OCR) is applied to the scanned notes to allow clinicians to search all the files to discover more links between conditions or families.



A 'paperless' system has many benefits:

- We are able to access a family record immediately, from anywhere in the UHL estate
- We can look at a record at the same time as one of our colleagues working with the same family
- We can securely download a family file to an iPad for home visits/ peripheral clinics
- We no longer have to search for files on shelves hoping that the record is where we expect
- We can use the advanced searching capabilities to find information contained within the family file itself. For example, looking for all patients with a certain problem

- We can now place additional security on sensitive records and track who has seen them and thereby improving our information governance capability
- We have managed to clear several rooms that were used to store family records, giving us the opportunity to convert some of them into new clinic rooms
- We can view images and other information we previously stored on separate network locations in the same context as the family record
- All the incoming posts and reports are scanned and uploaded to the system usually within 24 hours

Looking to the future, we are investigating how we can link together all our IT systems we use within the department and thereby further automate and improve our capabilities.



Medical Day Case Unit





The Medical Day Case Unit (MDCU) aims to treat each patient individually, to ensure their diagnosis or treatment is performed efficiently and in a caring manner, so they are ready to be safely discharged home on the same day.



The MDCU (previously known as Odames Day Case Unit when based at Leicester Royal Infirmary) is open from **06.30 to 18.00 Monday - Friday** and is based on Ward 1 at

Leicester General Hospital.

MDCU offers a range of treaments and diagnostics. The list is not exhaustive and treatments can be negotiated.

MDCU is a nurse led area and medical cover is provided by the Specialist Registrar for medicine covering the General.

MDCU can offer:

- Blood transfusions (that meet the Units criteria). Non emergency transfusions generally require one days notice dependent upon the time of referral.
- Phlebotomy
- Venesection
- Ascitic drain (after acceptance from a Gastroenterologist)
- A wide range of intravenous infusions, i.e. Iron, methlprednisolone, immunoglobulins, antibiotics, bisphosphonates and more.
- Rheumatology: Epidural, joint injections, muscle biopsy.

If you would like to refer anyone for treatment, please call 0116 258 4012 to discuss with a member of the nursing team.

A decision to admit and treat will be given and you will then be asked to fax a patient summary so that prescriptions can be generated and treatment commenced.

The Alliance will support the left shift of activity into a community setting with the aim of improving the patient journey, stopping duplication and taking unnecessary steps out of the patient pathway. The Alliance provides a good vehicle to support this. It will also work closely with the LLR Better Care Together programme.

We are currently reviewing the existing contract and service delivery with a view to improving and making this efficient prior to any left shift, which is not likely to occur until later in the year.

The second annual sudden arrhythmic death syndrome (SADS) Awareness Conference has been organised by local charity, Joe Humphries Memorial Trust (JHMT) in conjunction with UHL.

Tuesday 14 October 2014

Leicester Tigers rugby stadium, Aylestone Road, Leicester.

SADS is part of a group of subtle heart diseases that claim the lives of 12 teenagers and young adults, aged 12-35, every week in the UK.

The conference opens at 10am with an address by Martin Johnson, ex-rugby international player and Patron of the charity, and features a range of speakers including Professor Charles Deakin, Professor of Resuscitation and Pre-hospital
