

Welcome to the June edition of the GP Newsletter Acute Fatty Liver of Pregnancy - (AFLP)

Following a recent case of AFLP within UHL, the Obstetrics Team are highlighting this rare [1 in 20000 pregnancies], but potentially fatal condition.



known what causes this pregnancy specific liver condition but there is

thought it is a variant of pre-eclampsia (raised blood pressure and protein in the urine caused by pregnancy).

It has also been linked to an inherited enzyme deficiency called long chain acyl-CoA dehydrogenase (LCHAD) in the baby.

The condition is more likely to occur in first pregnancies, multiple pregnancies and in women carrying a male child.

How is Acute Fatty Liver of Pregnancy diagnosed?

Diagnosis is made through a combination of clinical presentation and blood biochemistry.

Symptoms may include:

- Nausea and
- vomiting
- Lack of appetite
- Abdominal pain and indigestion

The symptoms of AFLP are non-specific and can be mistaken for other conditions, making diagnosis difficult. Early diagnosis can save the life of the baby and mother.

Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm Screening

The NHS AAA Screening Programme aims to reduce deaths from the condition among men aged 65 and over by up to 50 percent by detecting AAA early and offering appropriate monitoring or treatment

Men aged 65 and over are most at risk from the condition and invitations for screening are being sent to men in Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland in the year they turn 65. For men aged 65 and over who have not previously been screened, more information can be obtained by contacting the local screening service on **0116 258 6820**.



Opportunity for Heart Failure Patients to be Part of a Clinical Trial

We are carrying out a multicentre, randomised, double-blind, parallel group, active-controlled study to evaluate **the efficacy and safety of LCZ696 compared to valsartan** on morbidity and mortality in Heart Failure patients with preserved ejection fraction (HFpEF).

Unlike Heart Failure with reduced ejection fraction, no pharmacologic therapies have shown benefit in HFpEF. Thus, there is no evidencebased therapy specific for HFpEF, hence the need for clinical trials to investigate therapeutic options.



Do you have any patients with this diagnosis that would be interested in taking part in a clinical trial?

Exclusion Criteria: (main points)

Inclusion criteria:

- >55yrs
- LVEF >45%
- Symptoms of heart failure (NYHA II-IV)
- Structural heart disease diagnosed from ECHO/MRI etc
- Heart failure admission and/or elevated BNP

- Any prior LVEF <45%
- History of angioedema or hypersensitivity of any of the study drugs or in similar classes
- Probable alternative diagnosis that could account for symptoms such as significant pulmonary disease, anaemia, obesity (BMI >40kg/m2)

Leicester Fertility Clinic launches new website

As part of the Listening into Action (LiA) campaign, Leicester Fertility Centre engaged with patients, staff and clinicians to see how the unit could be improved for the benefit of patients and other service users.

A number of developments were identified including redesigning the Leicester Fertility Centre website. A recent GP survey also highlighted the need for a

distinct area of the website for clinicians enabling easily accessible information on the services we provide. The new website offers easy to access specific areas for patients, potential donors and healthcare professionals.

A complete downloadable list of information booklets can be found within the Healthcare Professionals section, making it easy to give patients the most up-to-date information.

Additional information for GPs includes the care pathway for patients for NHS or private treatment, information on arranging semen analyses and important contact information.



Ambulatory Pulmonary Embolism (PE) Clinic at Glenfield Hospital

In June 2010 Glenfield Hospital opened the doors of its Ambulatory PE Clinic. It is a Nurse-led service investigating, diagnosing and treating patients with a suspected PE as an outpatient.



June 2015 marked the 5th anniversary of the Clinic opening. In the first year the Clinic had an attendance of 350 patients and now has an annual attendance of almost 750 patients.

Patients are referred by GPs via Bed Bureau and Urgent Care Centres but we also review referrals from the acute teams based in ED and the Clinical Decisions Unit at Glenfield. All patients are seen and examined by the Specialist Nursing team and have bloods taken, an ECG, chest x-ray and a clinical examination. Further scans are arranged as appropriate, pending the results of the investigations and examination.



If following all investigations and consultation, the patient is diagnosed with a PE they are commenced on treatment, counselled on their medication and taught to self-inject Dalteparin. All diagnosed patients will have a further follow-up to check their INR, dosing of medication and malignancy screen together with a three month respiratory follow-up and are also referred to the UHL Anticoagulation Service.

Clinic Opening Times Monday to Friday 8.30am - 4.30pm

We are currently trialling longer opening hours on:

Mondays and Tuesdays until 6.00pm

Patients should be advised to attend the PE Clinic straight away following referral, no later than 3.30pm Monday and Tuesday (during the extended opening hours trial) and no later than 2.00pm Wednesday to Friday.

If a patient is unable to attend the clinic prior to these times you can provide treatment dose Dalteparin and refer the patient to clinic the next day via Bed Bureau. Please ensure that you provide a full clinic letter.

Inclusion Criteria

We accept patients 18 years and older that meet the following criteria:

- not pregnant
- more than 8 weeks post-partum
- mobile
- have access to a telephone and are able to give clear instructions
- patients must be compliant
- pulse has to be 110 or lower
- systolic greater than 100
- oxygen saturation 92% and greater
- respiratory rate of less than 30.

Exclusion Criteria

We are unable to accept patients who present with the following:

- diagnosis of a thrombus
- currently on anticoagulation treatment
- liver disease
- bleeding risk
- haematology disorders.
